Society of the United States Daughters of 1812 host charter ceremony an installation of officers

The John S. Roberts Chapter of the National Society of the United States Daughters of 1812 hosted a charter ceremony and installation of officers recently at the Old University Building in Nacogdoches. In addition to the 15 charter members of the newly formed chapter, three national society officers, the president of the Texas society, and invited guests from other lineage organizations were present. Organizing President Linda Sisk welcomed guests and presided over the general order of the service.

Karen Kurth Hall of the William Gann Chapter in Lufkin and current Registrar National gave the invocation which was followed by the pledge to the United States flag led by Helene Werner of the General Alexander McComb Chapter of Okemos, Michigan and current Recording Secretary National.

Bobbie Ann Anderson, regent of the Nacogdoches Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, led the American's Creed; Suzanne Warlick, president of the Stone Fort Chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, presided for the singing of the national

anthem and the salute to the Texas flag. Elizabeth Jenkins of the William Gann Chapter in Lufkin led the salute to the Flag of 1812.

Carolyn Ericson gave a brief history of John S. Roberts, the chapter's namesake, after which Texas State President Ora Jane Johnson of the John Cavet Chapter in Dallas formally presented charter #443 to Sisk. President Johnson received the report from the chapter nominating committee and presided over the election of officers. Mary Glenn of the Francis Fleshart Chapter of Texas City and current 3rd Vice-president National installed the following officers for the 2012-2014 term: Linda Sisk, president; Peggy Price, vice-president; Stella Adams, chaplain; Nelda Hammet, secretary; Lois Fitch, treasurer; Carolyn Ericson, registrar; and Shirley Kerr, librarian/curator.

H. Farrar Bentley, member of the General Society War of 1812, closed the ceremony with a benediction. During the refreshment hour, Patsy Hallman of the Federation of Women's Clubs gave a brief history and conducted tours of the Old University Building.

Community gathers at Old North Church

Angie McKinney held her 4-year-old daughter Grace McKinney so she could reach to ring the Old North Church bell to celebrate freedom as part of the bicentennial commemoration of the War of 1812.

The celebration was a family event for the McKinneys.

Grace's father, Tom McKinney, who has a doctorate in history, was the keynote speaker at the event.

Her grandmother, Louis Fitch, served as the bicentennial chairman of the Daughters of the War of 1812, and helped organize the event.

"This is just a great historical event we wanted to be here for," said Angie McKinney.

The war ended in a stalemate, with neither the Americans nor British gaining anything tangible, according

to a program provided at the event. The War of 1812 gave legitimacy to the American naval presence and ended the impressment of American sailors by the British Navy.

After the invocation, about 40 attendees joined in reciting the pledge of allegiance to the Texas and American flags, the salute to the flag of 1812 and the American's Creed.


Mayor Roger Van Horn presented a proclamation from the City of Nacogdoches.

Van Horn spoke about direct link between events of the past such as the War of 1812 and the advances made in America today. He also charged those present to continue to remember the past and honor those who made freedom possible.

Van Horn's proclamation was displayed along with four others sent by elected officials unable to be present, including Gov. Rick Perry, Senator Kay

McKinney, who is part of SFA's department of history spoke on the significance of the often forgotten War of 1812.

The names of the veterans of the War of 1812 buried in Nacogdoches County were read and the church

legally changed to John Fenley Roberts. He and Harriet had one son by the name of Lycurgus Roberts.

Rebecca Collier, step-daughter of John S. Roberts, was married to Zachariah P. Fenley, and they settled on Fenley Lake, near the Angelina River in what is now Angelina County. Shortly after the beginning of the Cordovan Rebellion, Aug. 8, 1838, one of Fenley's slaves was induced to join the conspiracy. Zachariah went in pursuit of the slave and was captured and murdered. On Dec. 1, 1839, Mrs. Fenley sued Vicente Cordova for the theft of her slave and recovered judgment against him. To satisfy the judgment, Cordova's half interest in the Old Stone Fort was sold at execution to Rebecca Fenley, who transferred the title to her mother, Mrs. Harriet

Roberts. Eventually Roberts operated a saloon in the building until his death Aug. 9, 1871. Thus the title to the Old Stone Fort passed into the hands of the Roberts family where it remained until purchased by Perkins Brothers in 1901.

After the Texas Revolution, Roberts formed a partnership with John Durst and George Allen to engage in the mercantile business across Fredonia Street, east of the Old Stone Fort. The next year the company was doing business as Roberts, Allen, and Company. In 1838, Durst bought out Allen and the firm of Roberts, Durst and Phillips was formed. Allen moved to Houston, a town founded in 1836 by his brothers, Augustus C. and John K. Allen.

Major Roberts was a charter member of Milam Lodge No. 40, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons in Nacogdoches. When Roberts County, Texas was created Aug. 21, 1876, it was named

in honor of John S. Roberts, one of the signers of the Declaration of Texas Independence, and other distinguished Texans of that name.

The newly organized chapter of United States Daughters of 1812 in Nacogdoches has been named in honor of John S. Roberts. The public is invited to help celebrate the bicentennial of the War of 1812 on June 18, 2012, at noon at Old North Church. The Ringing of the Bells for 1812 across the land will indicate the beginning of the bicentennial celebration. The program begins at 11:30 a.m., hosted by the John S. Roberts Chapter No. 443, with the bell ringing at noon. Make plans to attend and help the group celebrate the bicentennial.

History of 'Star-Spangled Banner'

Did you know?

- In the fourth stanza, Key urged the adoption of "In God is our Trust" as the national motto. The United States adopted the motto "In God We Trust" by law in 1956.
- From 1817 until his death in 1843, Key served as a vice president of the American Bible Society.

Editor's note: The United States is celebrating the bicentennial of the War of 1812 on June 18. This is the second installment in a three-part series about the war with Great Britain. This article concentrates on the history of the national anthem and the flag associated with it.

The story of "The Star Spangled Banner" begins with the 15-star, 15-stripe flag that inspired Francis Scott Key to write the famous four-stanza poem that later was adopted as our national anthem. The flag became known as the "Star-Spangled Banner Flag" and is on display today in the National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C.

It was on Sept. 3, 1814, that the young Maryland lawyer serving as district attorney of the District of Columbia heard about the capture of Dr. William Beanes in Baltimore. Key was determined to secure his friend's release and received approval from President James Madison to negotiate an exchange of British prisoners for Beanes.

The discussion took place on a boat in the harbor, and the British officers agreed to the exchange. However, because Key and John S. Skinner, who had accompanied him, had heard details of the British plans for the immediate attack on Baltimore, they were detained until after the battle. It was during the rainy night of Sept. 14, 1814, that Key witnessed the bombardment of Fort McHenry from

the flag would be displayed following the battle.

It was not until the dawn of morning light that Key saw that the smaller flag had been replaced with a much larger American flag. He was so inspired by the American victory and the triumphant flag flying above the fort that the next day he wrote the poem on the back of a letter he had kept in his pocket.

The original flag was 42 feet long and 30 feet high with each stripe about two feet and the stars about two feet in diameter. The flag was made by Mary Young Pickersgill and her assistants.

Following his release on Sept. 16, Key finished the poem at the Indian Queen Hotel in Baltimore where he was staying and he entitled it "The Defence of Fort McHenry." (Note the historical era-spelling of the word "defense.") The words fit a popular old British drinking song composed in London by John Stafford Smith, and Key's song quickly became popular in the United States. It was printed in 17 newspapers from Georgia to New Hampshire.

A few weeks later, it was published with the words and music together under the title

and Durang sang it at Captain McCauley's tavern.

Even though Key died in 1843, he witnessed the song's popularity which gave him a lasting reputation. Through the 1800s, bands played the anthem during public events, and in 1889 it was declared the official tune to be played at the raising of the flag. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson ordered it be played at military and other appropriate occasions, such as sporting events.

Finally on March 3, 1931, President Herbert Hoover signed the law making "The Star-Spangled Banner" the country's official national anthem.
